Welcome to St Peter's Cathedral. We are delighted to have you worship with us today for this Eucharist from the Book of Common Prayer. The order of service is in the separate booklet.

St Peter's Cathedral resides on the lands of the Kaurna people. We give thanks for their ancestors and acknowledge the ongoing right and responsibility of their elders to care for this Country. We are committed to work and pray towards a more just settlement for all Indigenous people and pay our respect to First Nations people with us.

St Peter's Cathedral is a Christ-centred, sacramental, inclusive, thinking, mission-oriented faith community.

This morning, we will ponder the idea of prayer. In our Old Testament reading from I Samuel, we will hear the story of Hannah read. And in place of our psalm, we will read Hannah's song. Hannah and her husband Elkanah have no children. Hannah devotes herself to a life of prayer for a child. Her devotion to persistently praying for a child when all hope would seemingly be lost sheds light on the idea of prayer. We will ponder the nature of prayer guided by poets and theologians - and by the story of Hannah.

As we gather in the Cathedral this morning, may we find ourselves gathered into the life of prayer, prayer in the midst of the blessings and struggles of those we love, of our community and of the whole world. Many we find ourselves nurtured in the life of prayer, by word and sacrament, in the presence of the Body of Christ gathered, and in the great love of God.

FIRST READING 1 SAMUEL 1:4-20

A reading from the First Book of Samuel.

On the day when Elkanah sacrificed, he would give portions to his wife Peninnah and to all her sons and daughters; but to Hannah he gave a double portion, because he loved her, though the Lord had closed her womb. Her rival used to provoke her severely, to irritate her, because the Lord had closed her womb. So it went on year after year; as often as she went up to the house of the Lord, she used to provoke her. Therefore Hannah wept and would not eat. Her husband Elkanah said to her, 'Hannah, why do you weep? Why do you not eat? Why is your heart sad? Am I not more to you than ten sons?'

After they had eaten and drunk at Shiloh, Hannah rose and presented herself before the Lord. Now Eli the priest was sitting on the seat beside the doorpost of the temple of the Lord. She was deeply distressed and prayed to the Lord, and wept bitterly. She made this vow: 'O Lord of hosts, if only you will look on the misery of your servant, and remember me, and not forget your servant, but will give to your servant a male child, then I will set him before you as a nazirite until the day of his death. He shall drink neither wine nor intoxicants, and no razor shall touch his head.'

As she continued praying before the Lord, Eli observed her mouth. Hannah was praying silently; only her lips moved, but her voice was not heard; therefore Eli thought she was drunk. So Eli said to her, 'How long will you make a drunken spectacle of yourself? Put away your wine.' But Hannah answered, 'No, my lord, I am a woman deeply troubled; I have drunk neither wine nor strong drink, but I have been pouring out my soul before the Lord. Do not regard your servant as a worthless woman, for I have been speaking out of my great anxiety and vexation all this time.' Then Eli answered, 'Go in peace; the God of Israel grant the petition you have made to him.' And she said, 'Let your servant find favour in your sight.' Then the woman went to her quarters, ate and drank with her husband, and her countenance was sad no longer.

They rose early in the morning and worshipped before the Lord; then they went back to their house at Ramah. Elkanah knew his wife Hannah, and the Lord remembered her. In due time Hannah conceived and bore a son. She named him Samuel, for she said, 'I have asked him of the Lord.'

SECOND READING

HEBREWS 10.11-14, 19-25

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews.

Every priest stands day after day at his service, offering again and again the same sacrifices that can never take away sins. But when Christ had offered for all time a single sacrifice for sins, 'he sat down at the right hand of God', and since then has been waiting 'until his enemies would be made a footstool for his feet.' For by a single offering he has perfected for all time those who are sanctified.

Therefore, my friends, since we have confidence to enter the sanctuary by the blood of Jesus, by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain (that is, through his flesh), and since we have a great priest over the house of God, let us approach with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful. And let us consider how to provoke one another to love and good deeds, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day approaching.

GOSPEL READING MARK 13.1-11

The Lord be with you.

And with thy spirit.

The Holy Gospel is written in the 13th Chapter of the Gospel according to Mark, beginning at verse 1.

Glory be to thee, O Lord.

As Jesus came out of the temple, one of his disciples said to him, 'Look, Teacher, what large stones and what large buildings!' Then Jesus asked him, 'Do you see these great buildings! Not one stone will be left here upon another; all will be thrown down.'

When he was sitting on the Mount of Olives opposite the temple, Peter, James, John, and Andrew asked him privately, 'Tell us, when will this be, and what will be the sign that all these things are about to be accomplished?' Then Jesus began to say to them, 'Beware that no one leads you astray. Many will come in my name and say, "I am he!" and they will lead many astray. When you hear of wars and rumours of wars, do not be alarmed; this must take place, but the end is still to come. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be earthquakes in various places; there will be famines. This is but the beginning of the birth pangs.

'As for yourselves, beware; for they will hand you over to councils; and you will be beaten in synagogues; and you will stand before governors and kings because of me, as a testimony to them. And the good news must first be proclaimed to all nations. When they bring you to trial and hand you over, do not worry beforehand about what you are to say; but say whatever is given you at that time, for it is not you who speak, but the Holy Spirit.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Port Sunday will take place during the 10:30am Eucharist next week - 24 November – the Feast of Christ the King. Please bring a bottle (or two) of port and place them on the altar in the Peace Chapel, under the flags.

The Purple Bench. The Diocese of Adelaide has a Domestic & Family Violence Working Group one of whose activities is to promote the annual "16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence" which takes place from 25 November (the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women) to 10 December (Human Rights Day). This year the working group's focus is on "The Purple Bench," an international project to commemorate women who have died as a result of domestic or family violence.

The Working Group has received seed funding from Diocesan Council to support the installation of purple benches in the grounds of Anglican churches and institutions throughout the Diocese of Adelaide. The Cathedral will be the 'lead' institution with the unveiling and blessing of a bench near the Memorial Garden to launch this year's '16 Days'. Bishop Chris and the Rev'd Tracy Lauersen, National Program Manager of the Anglican Church of Australia's Families and Culture Commission, will preside at a ceremony to be held at 1.30 pm on Sunday 24 November.


