We are delighted to have you worship with us today for this service of Choral Evensong from the Book of Common Prayer. As the clergy and choir lead this service, allow the words and music to bring you into a stillness and prayerful reflection with God. Please join us in saying the words in bold. The hymns can be found in the separate hymn book. Indications for sitting, kneeling, and standing are a guide only.

St Peter's Cathedral resides on the lands of the Kaurna people. We give thanks for their ancestors and acknowledge the ongoing right and responsibility of their elders to care for this Country. We are committed to work and pray towards a more just settlement for all Indigenous people and pay our respect to First Nations people with us.

St Peter's Cathedral is a Christ-centred, sacramental, inclusive, thinking, mission-oriented faith community.

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The themes of Advent, the church's season of preparation, begin with the passing away of the old and the breaking in of the new; then move to the preaching and ministry of John the Baptist; and finally the Annunciation to Mary of the birth of Christ.

This evening we present a narrated reading of a story from the new book *Caravan* by Adelaide priest and Cathedral Chapter member the Rev'd Canon Steve Daughtry, with illustrations by his wife Vanessa. The story we will hear is entitled "Be careful what you wish for." It focuses on Zechariah and Elizabeth, the relatives of the Blessed Virgin Mary who, like Mary, were blessed with a child whom we know was John the Baptist; and Mary's song of thanks and praise.

How would we respond to such extraordinary news? How many 'impossible' things have we witnessed in our own lives? Elizabeth and Zechariah opened their home and hearts to Mary – a broken woman. How might we learn to create sanctuary for those who are shunned? And as we listen to and reflect on the words of the Magnificat, we might wonder why Mary chose these words; and what words we might choose ourselves.

Following Choral Evensong all are warmly invited to the launch of the book at St Mark's College.

SECOND LESSON JOHN 3.22-36

The lesson from the Gospel according to John, chapter 3, beginning at verse 22.

Jesus and his disciples went into the Judean countryside, and he spent some time there with them and baptized. John also was baptizing at Aenon near Salim because water was abundant there; and people kept coming and were being baptized—John, of course, had not yet been thrown into prison.

Now a discussion about purification arose between John's disciples and a Jew. They came to John and said to him, 'Rabbi, the one who was with you across the Jordan, to whom you testified, here he is baptizing, and all are going to him.' John answered, 'No one can receive anything except what has been given from heaven. You yourselves are my witnesses that I said, "I am not the Messiah, but I have been sent ahead of him." He who has the bride is the bridegroom. The friend of the bridegroom, who stands and hears him, rejoices greatly at the bridegroom's voice. For this reason my joy has been fulfilled. He must increase, but I must decrease.'

The one who comes from above is above all; the one who is of the earth belongs to the earth and speaks about earthly things. The one who comes from heaven is above all. He testifies to what he has seen and heard, yet no one accepts his testimony. Whoever has accepted his testimony has certified this, that God is true. He whom God has sent speaks the words of God, for he gives the Spirit without measure. The Father loves the Son and has placed all things in his hands. Whoever believes in the Son has eternal life; whoever disobeys the Son will not see life, but must endure God's wrath.

Here ends the Lesson.


Tea/coffee after worship

January Office and Worship Schedule

The weekday worship schedule from Christmas to the end of January is according to the "January" pattern with Morning and Evening Prayer said privately, and the Eucharist celebrated on Wednesday at 7:30 am and 10 am (BCP), and Friday at 7:30 am. This pattern will commence from Thursday 26 December until Friday 31 January. During January, Sunday worship will be at the usual times of 8 am (BCP Eucharist), 10:30 am (Sung Eucharist) and 6 pm (Night Prayer).

On Sunday 29 December the Eucharist will be celebrated at 8 am and 10:30 am as usual, but there will be no 6 pm service. On Wednesday I January, there will be no 7:30 am Eucharist, but the BCP Eucharist will be celebrated as usual at 10 am.
