Welcome to St Peter's Cathedral. We are delighted to have you worship with us today for this Eucharist from the Book of Common Prayer. The order of service is in the separate booklet.

St Peter's Cathedral resides on the lands of the Kaurna people. We give thanks for their ancestors and acknowledge the ongoing right and responsibility of their elders to care for this Country. We are committed to work and pray towards a more just settlement for all Indigenous people and pay our respect to First Nations people with us.

St Peter's Cathedral is a Christ-centred, sacramental, inclusive, thinking, mission-oriented faith community.

This Sunday, the Third Sunday in Advent, we spend a little more time with John the Baptist, that prophet who lived in the wilderness dressed in camel's hair with a leather belt around his waist, interestingly eating locusts and wild honey. We spend some time with John the Baptist and we also spend time with readings characterised by joy. The prophet Zephaniah speaks of joy deep in the knowledge that God will bring the people home. Paul, writing to the people of Philippi, encourages rejoicing in all things, however difficult they might be. Our pink candle and our pink vestments remind us this *Gaudate* Sunday that our reflections on repentance take place in the midst of whisperings of joy. As we hear John the Baptist exhorting us to a time of reflection and repentance, may we do so, sensing the deep joy that comes from sitting with the truth of our frailty, knowing we are held in the love of God.

CEREMONY OF THE LIGHTING OF THE ADVENT CANDLE

Priest Today is the third Sunday in Advent. We light a candle each week to remind us that Jesus brings light into the dark places of the world.

The first candle (purple, the Candle of Hope) is lit

Reader We light the candle of hope to proclaim that God's light is coming into the world.

The second candle (purple, the Candle of Peace) is lit

Reader We light the candle of peace to proclaim that God's promises will be fulfilled in the birth of Jesus – Prince of Peace.

The third candle (rose-pink, the Candle of Joy) is lit

Celebrant We rejoice and sing out with gladness at the message of God's salvation.

- *Reader* We light the candle of joy to celebrate that God's saving power is coming into the world.
- All God of joy, we rejoice as we look forward to your breaking into human history, revealing in person your justice and your love. Amen.

THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

O Lord Jesu Christ, who at thy first coming didst send thy messenger to prepare thy way before thee: Grant that the ministers and stewards of thy mysteries may likewise so prepare and make ready thy way, by turning the hearts of the disobedient to the wisdom of the just, that at thy second coming to judge the world we may be found an acceptable people in thy sight, who livest and reignest with the Father and the Holy Spirit, ever one God, world without end. **Amen.**

FIRST READING

A reading from the Prophet Zephaniah.
Sing aloud, O daughter Zion; shout, O Israel!
Rejoice and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem!
The Lord has taken away the judgements against you, he has turned away your enemies.
The king of Israel, the Lord, is in your midst; you shall fear disaster no more.
On that day it shall be said to Jerusalem:
Do not fear, O Zion; do not let your hands grow weak. ZEPHANIAH 3.14-20

The Lord, your God, is in your midst, a warrior who gives victory; he will rejoice over you with gladness, he will renew you in his love; he will exult over you with loud singing as on a day of festival. I will remove disaster from you, so that you will not bear reproach for it. I will deal with all your oppressors at that time. And I will save the lame and gather the outcast, and I will change their shame into praise and renown in all the earth. At that time I will bring you home, at the time when I gather you; for I will make you renowned and praised among all the peoples of the earth, when I restore your fortunes before your eyes, says the Lord. Hear the word of the Lord, Thanks be to God.

A SONG OF ISAIAH

Please respond with the words in bold

'Behold, God is my salvation:
I will trust and will not be afraid;
'For the Lord God is my strength and my song: and has become my salvation.'
With joy you will draw water:
from the wells of salvation.
On that day you will say:
'Give thanks to the Lord, call upon his name;
'Make known his deeds among the nations:
proclaim that his name is exalted.
'Sing God's praises, who has triumphed gloriously:
let this be known in all the world.
'Shout and sing for joy, you that dwell in Zion:
for great in your midst is the Holy One of Israel.'

SECOND READING

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Philippians.

Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Hear the word of the Lord,

Thanks be to God.

GOSPEL READING

The Lord be with you.

And with thy spirit.

The Holy Gospel is written in the 3rd Chapter of the Gospel according to Luke, beginning at verse 7.

Glory be to thee, O Lord.

John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, 'You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, "We have Abraham as our ancestor"; for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children to Abraham. Even now the axe is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.'

And the crowds asked him, 'What then should we do?' In reply he said to them, 'Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise.' Even tax-collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, 'Teacher, what should we do?' He said to them, 'Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you.' Soldiers also asked him, 'And we, what should we do?' He said to them, 'Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages.'

As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, John answered all of them by saying, 'I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire.'

So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise be to thee, O Christ.

Advent 3 Choral Evensong - Story Reading from Caravan by Steve Daughtry




