## THE PRESENTATION OF CHRIST IN THE TEMPLE

#### **SUNDAY 2 FEBRUARY 2025**

**8** AM

Welcome to St Peter's Cathedral. We are delighted to have you worship with us today for this Eucharist from the Book of Common Prayer. The order of service is in the separate booklet.

St Peter's Cathedral resides on the lands of the Kaurna people. We give thanks for their ancestors and acknowledge the ongoing right and responsibility of their elders to care for this Country. We are committed to work and pray towards a more just settlement for all Indigenous people and pay our respect to First Nations people with us.

### St Peter's Cathedral is a Christ-centred, sacramental, inclusive, thinking, mission-oriented faith community.

Today we celebrate the feast of 'The Presentation of Christ in the Temple' also called 'The Purification of St Mary the Virgin' as they are named in the Book of Common Prayer. Colloquially, it is referred to as 'Candlemas'. Traditionally at this time churches would bless their candles for the following year and congregants' candles were also blessed at a special Eucharist (Mass), hence the name 'Candle Mass'. The lighting of candles reminds us that Jesus is the Light of the World –'a light for revelation to the Gentiles and glory to your people Israel' (Luke 2: 22). 'The Presentation of Christ in the Temple' completes the infancy narratives associated with Christmas. This evening at 6pm we are having a special service of 'Candlemas Carols'. Do come along and enjoy this unique service.

A reading from the prophet Malachi.

See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the Lord of hosts. But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears?

For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the Lord in righteousness. Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the Lord as in the days of old and as in former years.

SECOND READING

HEBREWS 2.14-18

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews.

Since, therefore, the children share flesh and blood, he himself likewise shared the same things, so that through death he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by the fear of death. For it is clear that he did not come to help angels, but the descendants of Abraham. Therefore he had to become like his brothers and sisters in every respect, so that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make a sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the people. Because he himself was tested by what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested.

GOSPEL READING LUKE 2.22-40

The Lord be with you.

And with thy spirit.

The Holy Gospel is written in the 2nd Chapter of the Gospel according to Luke, beginning at verse 22.

#### Glory be to thee, O Lord.

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought Jesus up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtle-doves or two young pigeons.'

Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying,

'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.'

And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too.'

There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband for seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and

prayer night and day. At that moment she came, and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem.

When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise be to thee, O Christ.

- After the 10:30 am Eucharist, tea and coffee is offered weekly.



#### Hope after the No Vote

Wednesday, 12 February 2025 6pm – 7pm Cynthia Poulton Hall, St Peter's Cathedral, 27 King William Rd, North Adelaide

**Bishop Chris McLeod** will explore theologically what 'Hope' means for First Nations' peoples after the 'No' vote in the referendum to establish a First Nations' Voice to Federal Parliament embodied in the Australian Constitution. He will draw upon contemporary First Nations' reflections on 'Hope' and suggest a way forward to see 'Hope' embodied in action.

#### Theology Meets the People: Messages of Hope for 2025

Three theologians share their messages of hope.

#### Rev'd Dr Lyndon Shakespeare - Spaces of Hope

Christianity is an embedded faith. The story of God and God's people cannot be told without reference to spaces and places: towns, mountains, cities, and even buildings and rooms. From Eden to the New Jerusalem, God is present with the created order in and through places. In this talk, I will explore the way Christian hope can be understood spatially as our response and cooperation with God's providence at work in the physical spaces around our church buildings. I do this by attending to ideas and examples of placemaking that are designed around fostering hope through engaging the local community and building spaces of belonging.

#### **Rev'd Canon Jenny Wilson** – Preaching as an Act of Hope

Is it possible that preachers in our time and place, saying to our people, "Here is your God", are participating in an act of hope?

Get you up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good tidings; lift up your voice with strength, say to the cities of Judah, 'Here is your God!' (Isaiah 40:9)

#### Rev'd Dr Michael Trainor - Hope in the Gospel of Luke

In a world of imperial hegemony, wealth disparity and preferential option for the powerful and famous, Luke offers a word of hope to seekers of integrity and faithful discipleship struggling in a Greco-Roman world removed in time and place from the ministry and mission of the Galilean Jesus.
