

BCP EUCHARIST PROPERS THE 8TH SUNDAY AFTER EPIPHANY SUNDAY 2 MARCH 2025

Welcome to St Peter's Cathedral. We are delighted to have you worship with us today for this Eucharist from the Book of Common Prayer. The order of service is in the separate booklet.

St Peter's Cathedral resides on the lands of the Kaurna people. We give thanks for their ancestors and acknowledge the ongoing right and responsibility of their elders to care for this Country. We are committed to work and pray towards a more just settlement for all Indigenous people and pay our respect to First Nations people with us.

St Peter's Cathedral is a Christ-centred, sacramental, inclusive, thinking, mission-oriented faith community.

In this Sunday morning's Old Testament reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah, we hear the voice of the Lord comparing the word of the Lord to the rain that comes down from heaven watering the earth, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater. "So shall my word be ... it shall not return to me empty but shall accomplish that which I shall purpose," the Lord says. (Isaiah 55:10-11)

We will ponder the words of Jesus, the Word, in the final portion of the sermon on the Plain, from the Gospel of Luke. May the many tiny parables contained there be a blessing to us as we allow their strangeness to challenge us, as we allow Jesus to guide us in our lives as children of God. May Jesus' words 'accomplish in us' the blessing he hopes to give.

FIRST READING ISAIAH 55:10-13

A reading from the prophet Isaiah.

For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven, and do not return there until they have watered the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and succeed in the thing for which I sent it.

For you shall go out in joy,
and be led back in peace;
the mountains and the hills before you
shall burst into song,
and all the trees of the field shall clap their hands.
Instead of the thorn shall come up the cypress;
instead of the brier shall come up the myrtle;
and it shall be to the Lord for a memorial,
for an everlasting sign that shall not be cut off.

PSALM 92.1-4; 92.12-15

Please respond with the words in bold type.

How good to give thanks to the Lord: to sing praises to your name, O Most High,

To declare your love in the morning: and at night to sing of your faithfulness,

Upon the lute, upon the lute of ten strings: and to the melody of the lyre.

For in all you have done, O Lord, you have made me glad: I will sing for joy because of the works of your hands.

The righteous shall flourish like the palm tree: they shall spread abroad like a cedar in Lebanon;

For they are planted in the house of the Lord: and flourish in the courts of our God.

In old age they shall be full of sap: they shall be sturdy and laden with branches;

And they will say that the Lord is just: the Lord my Rock, in whom is no unrighteousness.

SECOND READING

1 CORINTHIANS 15.51-58

A reading from the first letter of Paul to the Corinthians.

Listen, I will tell you a mystery! We will not all die, but we will all be changed, in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trumpet. For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable, and we will be changed. For this perishable body must put on imperishability, and this mortal body must put on immortality. When this perishable body puts on imperishability, and this mortal body puts on immortality, then the saying that is written will be fulfilled:

'Death has been swallowed up in victory.'

'Where, O death, is your victory?

Where, O death, is your sting?"

The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

Therefore, my beloved, be steadfast, immovable, always excelling in the work of the Lord, because you know that in the Lord your labour is not in vain.

Hear the word of the Lord,

Thanks be to God.

GOSPEL READING LUKE 6.39-49

The Lord be with you.

And with thy spirit.

The Holy Gospel is written in the 6th Chapter of the Gospel according to Luke, beginning at verse 39.

Glory be to thee, O Lord.

Jesus told them a parable: 'Can a blind person guide a blind person? Will not both fall into a pit? A disciple is not above the teacher, but everyone who is fully qualified will be like the teacher. Why do you see the speck in your neighbour's eye, but do not notice the log in your own eye? Or how can you say to your neighbour, "Friend, let me take out the speck in your eye", when you yourself do not see the log in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your neighbour's eye.

'No good tree bears bad fruit, nor again does a bad tree bear good fruit; for each tree is known by its own fruit. Figs are not gathered from thorns, nor are grapes picked from a bramble bush. The good person out of the good treasure of the heart produces good, and the evil person out of evil treasure produces evil; for it is out of the abundance of the heart that the mouth speaks.

'Why do you call me "Lord, Lord", and do not do what I tell you? I will show you what someone is like who comes to me, hears my words, and acts on them. That one is like a man building a house, who dug deeply and laid the foundation on rock; when a flood arose, the river burst against that house but could not shake it, because it had been well built. But the one who hears and does not act is like a man who built a house on the ground without a foundation. When the river burst against it, immediately it fell, and great was the ruin of that house.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

Praise be to thee, O Christ.
