

various forms of art throughout the centuries.


This Epic Poem by J.S. Jackson explores the question: What happened between Christ's crucifixion and resurrection? It is the story of the Hero of Heroes.

An Altar in the World

In An Altar in the World, Barbara Brown Taylor shares how she learned to encounter God far beyond the walls of the church. She reveals meaningful ways to discover the sacred in the small things we do and see, from simple practices such as walking, working, and prayer. Something as ordinary as hanging clothes on a clothesline becomes an act of meditation if we pay attention to what we're doing and take time to notice the sights, smells,

and sounds around us. Making eye contact with the cashier at the grocery store becomes a moment of true human connection. Allowing yourself to get lost leads to new discoveries.

As we incorporate these practices into our daily lives, we begin to discover altars everywhere we go, in nearly everything we do. Through her expert guidance and delicate, thought-provoking prose, we learn to live with purpose, pay attention, slow down, and revere

Hope25 Lenten Studies aims to encourage daily reflection on the hope we find in Jesus as we move through the Lenten season toward the joyful observance of his resurrection on Easter Day.

The Lenten study book contains 47 commentaries written by Australian bishops, along with reflections, corresponding to the daily Bible readings from Ash Wednesday to Easter Day. It is organized into six themes focusing on the hope held by Christians, drawing from specific biblical passages. Each theme concludes with a personal testimony from an Anglican parishioner about discovering hope in Jesus, followed by a series of contemplation questions.
