

BCP EUCHARIST PROPERS THE 1ST SUNDAY IN LENT SUNDAY 9 MARCH 2025

8 AM

Welcome to St Peter's Cathedral. We are delighted to have you worship with us today for this Eucharist from the Book of Common Prayer. The order of service is in the separate booklet.

St Peter's Cathedral resides on the lands of the Kaurna people. We give thanks for their ancestors and acknowledge the ongoing right and responsibility of their elders to care for this Country. We are committed to work and pray towards a more just settlement for all Indigenous people and pay our respect to First Nations people with us.

St Peter's Cathedral is a Christ-centred, sacramental, inclusive, thinking, mission-oriented faith community.

'Power tends to corrupt, and absolute power corrupts absolutely' is a phrase attributed to Lord Acton appearing in a letter to Bishop Mandell Creighton, Bishop of Peterborough and London in the 19th century. The temptation of Jesus in Luke and Matthew is a temptation to absolute power. Power to use miracle for self-service; power over the kingdoms of the world; and power over God. Satan tempts Jesus with all these things if only Jesus would worship Satan himself. This is, of course, known as the Faustian bargain – the selling of the soul to gain wealth and power. However, Jesus stands firm. His answers are taken from the Scriptures, and Satan leaves for the time being.

We should not think of the temptations of Jesus as being any less real than the temptations that befall us. The temptation for Jesus to be lured away from the mission of God must have been agonizing for him. However, we find in Jesus a model for ourselves. We may be tempted not only to corrupt power but in other areas of our lives. During the season of Lent we focus on those areas of our lives that tempt us away from following Jesus and his values. Just like Jesus, however, we can draw on God's love and strength to help us during our times of trial.

FIRST READING

DEUTERONOMY 26.1-11

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy.

When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess, and you possess it, and settle in it, you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the Lord your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the Lord your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time, and say to him, 'Today I declare to the Lord your God that I have come into the land that the Lord swore to our ancestors to give us.' When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the Lord your God, you shall make this response before the Lord your God: 'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labour on us, we cried to the Lord, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. The Lord brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O Lord, have given me.' You shall set it down before the Lord your God and bow down before the Lord your God. Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the Lord your God has given to you and to your house.

PSALM 91.1-2; 91.9-16

Please respond with the words in bold type.

Those who dwell in the shelter of the Most High: who abide under the shadow of the Almighty,

They will say to the Lord 'You are my refuge and my stronghold: my God in whom I trust.'

The Lord himself is your refuge: you have made the Most High your stronghold.

Therefore no harm will befall you: nor will any scourge come near your tent.

For he will command his angels: to keep you in all your ways.

They will bear you up in their hands: lest you dash your foot against a stone.

You will tread on the lion and the adder: the young lion and the serpent you will trample under foot.

'You have set your love upon me,' says the Lord, 'and therefore I will deliver you:
I will lift you out of danger,
because you have known my name.

'When you call upon me I will answer you: I will be with you in trouble, I will rescue you and bring you to honour.

'With long life I will satisfy you: and fill you with my salvation.'

SECOND READING ROMANS 10.4-13

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Romans.

Christ is the end of the law so that there may be righteousness for everyone who believes.

Moses writes concerning the righteousness that comes from the law, that 'the person who does these things will live by them.' But the righteousness that comes from faith says, 'Do not say in your heart, "Who will ascend into heaven?" (that is, to bring Christ down) 'or "Who will descend into the abyss?" (that is, to bring Christ up from the dead). But what does it say?

'The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart'

(that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is

saved. The scripture says, 'No one who believes in him will be put to shame.' For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. For, 'Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

GOSPEL READING LUKE 4.1-15

The Lord be with you.

And with thy spirit.

The Holy Gospel is written in the 4th Chapter of the Gospel according to Luke, beginning at verse 1.

Glory be to thee, O Lord.

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing at all during those days, and when they were over, he was famished. The devil said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become a loaf of bread.' Jesus answered him, 'It is written, "One does not live by bread alone."

Then the devil led him up and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And the devil said to him, 'To you I will give their glory and all this authority; for it has been given over to me, and I give it to anyone I please. If you, then, will worship me, it will all be yours.' Jesus answered him, 'It is written,

"Worship the Lord your God, and serve only him."

Then the devil took him to Jerusalem, and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple, saying to him, 'If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, for it is written,

"He will command his angels concerning you, to protect you",

and

"On their hands they will bear you up, so that you will not dash your foot against a stone."

Jesus answered him, 'It is said, "Do not put the Lord your God to the test." When the devil had finished every test, he departed from him until an opportune time.

Then Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country. He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.
